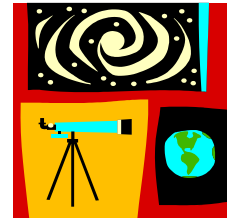

The Institute of Technical Sciences sponsored two events for students during the third quarter. Young people who have shown an interest in the construction trades were invited to attend the Florida Department of Transportation's Annual "Construction Days" event. Representatives from many construction-related fields were present to present displays and answer questions about employment opportunities and job qualifications in their areas. One popular aspect of the Construction Days event is the

opportunity to help drive some of the heavy equipment that is used by the construction industry. Another group of students attended the University of South Florida's Engineering Expo on February 24th. The expo features exhibits by the school of engineering, and private industry, the opportunity to speak to faculty and students from USF, and engineering shows and competitions. In its thirty-first year, the expo educates high school students and the public about how math, science, engineering

and technology affect our everyday lives. Exhibits in public works, space age advancements, environmental conservation, computer technology, robotics and many other areas were available to our students. In addition to these student field trips, members of the ITS faculty devoted a portion of the state inservice day, February 16th, to a tour of the Marchman Technical Education Center. The informational tour, conducted by Marchman principal, Robert Aguis, was directed towards making our ITS fac-

ulty members more aware of the programs available through Marchman, allowing them to council students and parents from a more informed position regarding technical education. A portion of the Institute of Technical Sciences' program description aligns closely with the technical opportunities available through Marchman.

During the months of February and March the guidance counselors have been busy helping students complete their course registration cards for the 2004-05 school year. Each 9th, 10th and 11th grader attended a presentation about the registration process. A registration card and a course description newspaper was given to every student. Students then had time to

work with their teachers and parents before sitting with a guidance counselor to review their selections. Guidance Staff also did presentations at Chasco Middle and Gulf Middle Schools. An Open House, targeting the incoming ninth graders, was held on March 23. Seniors who are continuing their education after high school are reminded to complete the FAFSA

(Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The money is distributed on a first come first served basis.

During the spring, the guidance staff will have presentations for the juniors from Pasco-Hernando Community College and St. Petersburg College. Juniors who are meeting the criteria for enrollment in a four year college will be invited to attend a presentation by the University of South Florida. College bound juniors are encouraged to take the ACT and SAT Tests this year. During the registration process tenth graders attended a presentation by Marchman Technical

Education Center. It is not too late to apply for a Marchman program for the 2004-05 school year. Call Marchman at 774-1700 for more information.

On April 1, tenth graders will participate in an activity called Reality Store. This activity, sponsored by the West Pasco Chamber of Commerce, is a budgeting activity where students are given an annual salary and asked to purchase everything they would need to live independently for a year. Ask your tenth grader how they did!
